Previously Rob was a striker for teams near and far, including Walthamstow, Wadham Lodge, Brimsdown Rovers, Broxbourne Borough, Hertford Town, Codicote, Colney Heath, Hatfield, Bournemouth FC, New Milton Town, Stotfold, Potton United and Swanage.

Over the years, several of the CCFC squad played alongside him, including Cemal Agdelen, Geoff Ocran, Sham Darr and Eliot Crosbie.

And last season, Teps turned out for Clapton CFC too, playing up front in our international home friendly against Sant Miquel.

At our next men's team home game

on Saturday, February 15th, we will also be holding a minute's silence for him.

The family are asking for any charity donations to be made to Football Beyond Borders, a charity doing work in an area that he felt strongly about.

OLD SPOTTED Dog Pub Plans

Plans have been submitted to restore the "severely dilapidated" disused Old Spotted Dog pub and build a 68-room hotel on its car park.

Parts of Grade II-listed The Spotted Dog Inn in Forest Gate dating back to the 15th and 19th centuries could be renovated to provide a bar, restaurant and coffee lounge if the bid goes ahead.

The pub next to the football ground was a hunting lodge used by Henry VIII before becoming a drinking hole but has been closed since 2004 and is on Historic England's at risk register.



The Heritage Advisory organisation has described it as "severely dilapidated" with the need to stop the rot "becoming still more urgent".

Developer Highpride Properties has made the bid which also includes plans for the four storey, 68 room hotel on the corner of Upton Lane and Wyatt Road.

A reinstated conservatory, space for an outdoor marquee and a pergola linking the listed building to the hotel extension are also among the plans.

The bid follows meetings between the developer and Save the Spotted Dog campaign members where the pub's supporters urged Highpride to save the building, return it to pub use, provide a "safe" garden with children's play area and additional community space, documents show.



DR WALDEMAR SPIER Pokal tournament

LAST MONTH SAW CLAPTON CFC SEND A stellar mixed 6-a-side team to the 2020 Dr Waldemar Spier Pokal tournament hosted by our friends at F95 Antirazzista Alliance of Fortuna Düsseldorf. The team lived up to CCFC's weekly tradition of high drama with pain, penalties and pratting about with some new best mates.

Dr Waldemar Spier, a Düsseldorf dentist and Fortuna member was expelled from his club in by the Nazis in 1933 just before Fortuna won the German championship. Dr Spier eventually died on the 2nd March 1945 in Auschwitz.

The tournament serves to remember him and all other victims of the Nazi regime. It's also an opportunity to bring together progressive fan groups from across Germany and Europe, with the football itself accompanied by food, drink, music and lots of chances to meet with friends old and new.

Game 1 saw CCFC take on hockey ultras Pferde DEG, and only 4 minutes into the match, renowned keeper Martin managed to dislocate his shoulder in the process of letting in the game's only goal. The Düsseldorf crowd applauded him off to hospital to the bemusement of our team. Game 2 was the BFF's derby against our hosts from the summer, Roter Stern Leipzig.

Our three players from CCFC's newly-minted Women and non-binary 5s team (Annabel, Gabi & Jess) paid no mind though, with a game of crunching tackles and non-stop line running. CCFC won 2-1. Our third match was with the Antirasisters, who despite a strong counteroffensive gameplan, fell to some surprising efforts from CCFC and a 3-1 result.

Clapton would rue not taking the clean sheet though, as it all came down to the final group game against local Fortuna fans and last year's champions Dangermouth, who could also progress to the quarters. Rumours abound that they plied

In the final prize ceremony Colegio were awarded with the Dr Waldemar Spier plate as this year's champions, and each team was presented with gifts from the other teams in attendance, CCFC triumphantly walking away with more peppermint booze and Dresden stollen. Following on from the previous night's pre-tournament drinks, our hosts brought the tournament to close with an all-night techno party, CCFC throwing shapes in spite of varying injuries.

The following day's recovery brunch at the local Fanprojekt was a much-needed chance to reflect on the weekend with new friends and slowly recover. Undeterred, our football nerd contingent took the opportunity to watch the local U16s play a match in the rain, CCFC banner posted up on the side and foul throws loudly contested.

A great weekend in Düsseldorf and yet another fantastic reminder that our Clapton community is part of a wider family of like-minded, fan-powered groups across Europe. A huge thank you from CCFC to everyone at F95 Antirazzista Alliance.



THIS YEAR I HAVE BEEN LUCKY ENOUGH TO have been chosen as 1 of 33 people to run the London Marathon 2020 for UNICEF UK.

I have taken on this challenge partly because of sibling rivalry, with my sister having run the marathon before, but I've also been inspired by my late mother, who was an ambassador for the charity and spent a lot of her life fighting for justice and peace not only for children in war-torn nations, but for those in Waltham Forest as well.

An image that remains in my mind from childhood was the two of us in the living room watching a news item on the humanitarian crisis in Darfur with her being visibly upset at the devastation that the conflict had on young children. Children which should not be suffering and denied safety, simply because of their nationality.

For over 70 years UNICEF have provided life saving food, education, emergency relief, and

vaccines for children all over the world including Yemen, Syria, Myanmar, Bangladesh, Liberia and also in the UK. UNICEF receives no money from the UN budget and so relies entirely on donations, such as the funds that I am trying to raise by torturing myself for 26.2 miles in April.

At the moment training is tough. I'm a regular 5k runner and can often be seen outside the Peter May Centre in Walthamstow on Saturday morning for ParkRun. However, the prospect of running over 8 times that distance without breaking down seems daunting. As you might have discovered this season, I'm ever so slightly competitive, so I'm looking to complete this challenge in a half decent time, proving that the stereotypes about Goalkeepers aren't all true. I completed a marathon walk at the back end of last year in 6 and a half hours so something closer to 5 hours is my goal.

By the time the Marathon comes around in April I will also be the wrong side of 30, so I have to make sure I keep my knees as strong as possible after knocks against Wivenhoe and London Samurai this season. So begins an exciting regime of a good diet, daily gym-work and long cold runs in East London.

Our CCFC family are exceptional at showing support and solidarity to those who are on the wrong side of war, oppression or abuse. I'd be incredibly grateful for any donation either in person, or via my justgiving page.

life in Calais as difficult as possible.

I'm not going to lie; the purgatory of Calais and Dunkirk is incredibly depressing. Hundreds of people, including unaccompanied children sleeping rough in the bitter cold and rain.

It's the futility of it all. The work is hard, but nothing changes. It's a day-to-day cycle of survival. The definition of hand to mouth.

However, volunteering there is genuinely fun. You basically spend the day chopping vegetables or wood, meeting cool people and having great conversation.

In a way, being in Calais is reminiscent of Clapton CFC. It's a group of individuals, successfully running an organisation in a different way. In a way society says doesn't work. Yet, they are doing it with a lot of singing and dancing in the process.

This Christmas, my sister and I were lucky enough to personally go distribute the food in Dunkirk. It has a predominantly Kurdish community and they have to be the friendliest people I've ever met.

When you're pulling up the sheer number of people there hits you like a ton of bricks. Hundreds and hundreds of incredibly talented people just looking for an opportunity to have a life somewhere.

We served them food, ate dinner alongside them, had some great conversations and then ended up teaching the dance moves to Africa to try and keep warm.

It's the language skills that shocks me the most, so many of the people there can speak so many languages. In a points-based system, these people are on 500x the points of anyone I know.

As I said, if there is one thing I could say about Calais, it's you should go. It's a place that's hard to put into words: it's beautiful skies among a backdrop of barbed wire, it's all the hope and no hope at all.

IF THERE IS ONE THING I CAN SAY (OR WRITE) about Calais, it's you should go. Honestly, it's really easy. All you need to do is turn up and help.

There are several organisations supporting displaced people in northern France - all of which are entirely run by volunteers, both long and short term.

On the 1st of December 2015, The Refugee Community Kitchen was set up, its aim to provide hot meals to the refugees in northern France every day, without judgement.

The Refugee Community Kitchen have served food everyday since.

Something that couldn't be achieved without the hundreds of volunteers - even those that turn up for the day keep the cogs in motion.

These charities stand against the French police as well as the UK and French government. It's so far beyond a hostile environment - they actively make

IN NOVEMBER 2019, CLAPTON CFC spent £15,310.36, with over half of this covering an order for another batch of replica shirts (£6,704.38) and postage for sending out merchandise orders (£1,647.81). The other major expenses were the second instalment of our rent on the stadium at Wadham Lodge for the men's first team and an order for a new batch of scarves.

December was another quiet month because of the number of postponed games and other expenses relate mainly to the general monthly costs of running a football club. The main exception was costs related to the visit by Abu Dis Sports Club, the Palestinian girls team from Gaza: this included Clapton CFC paying for tickets to watch West Ham Ladies beat Manchester United.

In addition to this spending, the club also donated £300 to the LGBTQ+ youth homelessness charity akt.

Our income in December was £8,273.75, with the largest element almost £6000 for merchandise orders. With only one men's first team game in December (our 6-5 win on penalties in the Alec Smith Cup quarter-final against Stonewall FC) and no women's first team games, we still received £1,268.81 in match day donations.

ONCE AGAIN, THE CCFC WOMEN'S TEAM FOUND themselves wading through mud and standing water, and where once there was a centre spot for kick off, there now appeared to be a small boating lake.

Clapham started brightly and threatened the Tons goal with two free kicks on the edge of the box and a corner within the first fifteen minutes, but Susana Ferreira was looking strong in goal and kept her composure to keep the score level.

Clapham continued to attack, and on 16 minutes a perfectly placed through ball was picked up by their number 14 and shot past Ferreira.

The next ten minutes saw both teams chasing after the ball, pinging awkwardly off the potholed pitch and getting carried sideways by gusts of wind.

The Clapton corner taken by Ciara Monahan on 23 minutes should have given us a deserved equaliser had it not been for a determined punch from the Clapham keeper that diverted the ball off the bar.





In the closing stages of the half, Emily Link had a couple of menacing forays in from the right.

At the other end, Lucy Rolington was having absolutely none of it when Clapham's forward entered the box and she slide tackled like a perfectly timed juggernaut to deny Clapham another shot on goal.

A brilliant one-handed save by Ferreira just before halftime denied Clapham a two goal lead.

Play was back and forth, with Ferreira producing some stunning saves to keep Clapham at bay, and Monahan showing brilliance with an audacious sombrero to keep possession in midfield. A sombrero! The cheek of it...

But it was Clapham who went closest to scoring next with the ball firing off the bar.

The Tons had Ferreira to thank for keeping the score at 1-0 deep into the second half as she produced some more outstanding saves from a wave of Clapham shots, her work rate evident from the quagmire she was now wearing as a kit.

Into the last 15 minutes and it was a total Tonslaught as Clapton kept pushing forward time and time again.

It looked like we would find the equaliser when Verity Phillips burst through on goal. She picked her spot, but the Clapham keeper made an excellent save to book the South Londoners a place in the next round.

CLAPTON HISTORY BY CHRIS TYMKOW THE MIECZNIKOWSKI BROTHERS CLAPTON'S POLISH STARS OF THE EARLY 1900S

WADHAM LODGE HAS PLAYED ITS PART IN Clapton history before. From at least 1898-99 a team called Pemberton FC was based there. Pemberton had a left-winger named Walter Miecznikowski, whose father came from Poland, and whose talents earned him a call-up to a London side in February 1899. Walter Miecznikowski found himself playing alongside three Clapton players in the London team: McGahey, Cook and Stanley Briggs.

The Clapton players must have liked what they saw, for by the end of the 1899-1900 season Miecznikowski was firmly established in the Clapton side, scoring their third goal in a 3-0 London Charity Cup Final replay win against Old Carthusians.

An equally fine cricketer, Walter Miecznikowski (pictured) was in the Middlesex 2nd XI against both Essex and Surrey that summer. When football returned in the autumn, he celebrated with a hat-trick in a 9-0 Clapton win against Eastleigh at the Spotted Dog.

It was the 1900-01 season that saw Walter Miecznikowski noted by bigger audiences, as by January 1901 he was playing in the Football League for Notts County, still retaining his amateur status as a Clapton player, a common arrangement at the time.

January 1901 also marks the beginning of the available Clapton FC Minute Books, now stored at

the Bishopsgate Institute Archive.

On 28 January 1901 Walter Miecznikowski was on a Clapton sub-Committee to arrange a 'Smoking Concert'.

At the same meeting Walter's younger brother, Edward Miecznikowski, is named in the minutes, picked for Clapton Reserves. Edward, a clerk at the Braintree Manor steel works, was living with the Miecznikowskis' Warsaw-born father in Huddlestone Road, north London.

With two Miecznikowskis now at the club, Clapton often resorted to the nicknames 'Micky' and 'Micky junior' to distinguish the brothers. Both were named in the Clapton team to play Portsmouth in April 1901. The Fratton Park crowd saw Pompey win 8-2, but again Walter Miecznikowski's talents had been noted. He was in Portsmouth colours later that month, scoring their third goal in a 4-0 victory over Spurs with a 'brilliant drive'.

Walter Miecznikowski then seems to have signed both league terms with Fulham and amateur terms with Clapton, during which time both he and Edward played for the Tons in a friendly against Notts County at the Spotted Dog before a crowd of about 5,000.

By February 1903 Walter Miecznikowski was an occasional West Ham United player. Still on the books at the Spotted Dog, he was absent from

Clapton's away match against Shepherd's Bush at Tufnell Park that same month for a good reason – he was getting married.

Not that the fact stopped Edward Miecznikowski. Edward did his duties as his brother's Best Man, then headed off to the match!

Walter Miecznikowski's story then takes a dramatic turn. The month after he got married, the Clapton FC minutes record that the Secretary was 'asked to arrange with Mr Miecznikowski the form his present should take'.

This was near the end of a season that saw Miecznikowski, along with Clapton's Evans, play



in a West Ham side that lost 4-0 to Luton.

The first Clapton committee meeting of the following season was informed that the Secretary had paid £7. 2s to Messrs Chappell & Co 'in connection with the W Miecznikowski Testimonial'. Chappell & Co were music publishers who also sold pianos.

The Miecznikowskis' father had sold pianos for a living. Did Clapton FC buy Walter Miecznikowski a piano to help set up his new marriage home?

If they did, the FA decided, as they were to do with Harry Earle, that this infringed the Amateur code and counted as a payment.

The Clapton committee meeting of 26 October 1903 was cagey about how it recorded the matter, but noted a letter of resignation from Walter Miecznikowski and asked the Secretary to write 'and thank him for his past services and to say how deeply the committee regretted the circumstances that had compelled him to resign his membership'.

Walter Miecznikowski, along with his brother Edward, played some more matches for Fulham after that. In the 1904-05 season both Miecznikowskis joined a newly created team, Southern United FC. In the summer months Walter played cricket for Honor Oak, for whom in 1908 he hit 200 not out against Fulham, the reporter thinking him 'quite good enough for first class cricket'.

But Walter Miecznikowski's amateur football days were over. In August 1909 he applied to the FA to have his amateur status restored, but was refused.

He was in good company. The only other player refused at the time was with Northampton, but was destined to become famous elsewhere – a certain Herbert Chapman.
